There are many things that need to be said (see my “Local Issues” page) and I did not feel bringing up everything at Council meetings and reading even longer statements about issues not even before us in hearings would be productive. Those who care about bigger, long-range, or philosophical issues could come here and I could spare those at meetings who aren’t interested from having to listen to me. It also provides access for those who can’t make it to Council meetings or those who wish to get their information from more sources than just the Pilot’s articles and editorials.
